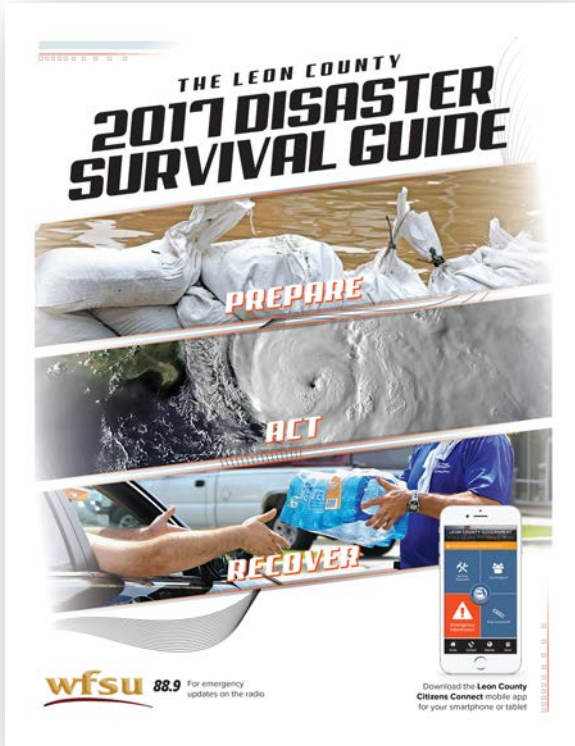

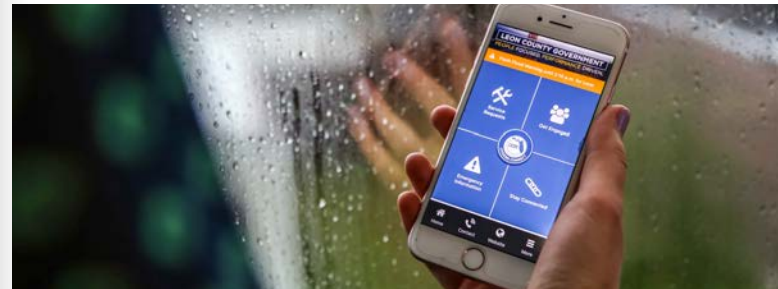

Hurricane Irma Daily Brief

STAY INFORMED. STAY CONNECTED.

For Sunday, September 10

As our community braces for Hurricane Irma, Leon County Emergency Management is preparing for response and recovery operations and executing our emergency plans for this powerful storm.

Most Current Weather Forecast

Irma's path shifted slightly back eastward, with the center of the storm passing near the Leon/Jefferson County line. If this forecast holds, we anticipate Irma to be a low-end Category 1 hurricane or strong tropical storm by the time it reaches our latitude. At this time, we are likely to receive sustained winds up to 40-50mph with gusts up to 75mph at peak intensity, which is expected between morning and mid-day tomorrow, Monday.

Leon County Imposes Countywide Curfew

In accordance with the local declared state of emergency issued on Tuesday, September 5 of this week, Leon County hereby imposes a countywide curfew as follows:

- Sunday, September 10 from 9 p.m. to Monday, September 11 at 7 a.m.
- Monday, September 11 from 9 p.m. to Tuesday, September 12 at 7 a.m.
- Tuesday, September 12 from 9 p.m. to Wednesday, September 13 at 7 a.m.

Issuing this curfew requires all Leon County residents and visitors to remain indoors during the prescribed times to allow first responders and emergency personnel to most effectively protect the safety of residents and property. The threat of hurricane force winds, downed trees and power lines also pose real risk to the public.

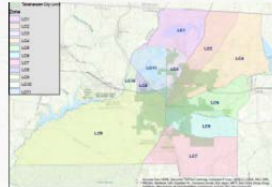

Leon County Recognizes Community Preparedness & Resilience in Face of Irma

Leon County Government, in coordination with the City of Tallahassee, Leon County Sheriff's Office, and many nonprofit partners throughout the community, would like to thank citizens and agencies for being prepared and resilient in the face of Hurricane Irma. An historic Atlantic storm that brought nearly eight hours of tropical-storm-force winds to Leon County and gusts of up to 54 miles per hour, Hurricane Irma made the community prepare, act, and recover. Leon County, along with many partners, distributed more than 100,000 sand bags, cleared many downed trees, and stayed in constant communication during the disaster while sheltering 3,000 evacuees and local residents with the American Red Cross.

Following Irma's sustained high winds, debris removal crews are working to collect all storm-related debris from unincorporated Leon County. Crews will not stop until all debris is collected, and to assist residents with yard debris collection, the Solid Waste Management Facility and rural waste sites will remain free of charge through **Sunday, October 8**.
